



What Do School Counselors Do?

Employed by public, private, and charter schools across the United States, school counselors change lives by making connections – **connections with children, youth and adolescents, and the community.**

Professional school counselors follow the American School Counselor Association's (ASCA) National Model, a framework outlining the components of a comprehensive school counseling program. Within the National Model, school counselors may serve in a variety of roles, including developing a school counseling curriculum, providing direct and indirect services to students, serving as consultants, using data to evaluate educational outcomes, and collaborating with other educational stakeholders.

A Day in the Life of a School Counselor

School counselors take on various responsibilities to help students achieve success. Here is a sample day in the life of a school counselor:

Elementary School Counselor

9 to 10 a.m.

Teach guidance lesson on career pathways with third-graders.

10 to 11 a.m.

Conduct individual counseling session with a fourth grade student.

11 to 11:30 a.m.

Discuss counseling initiatives with a group of teachers over lunch.

11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Lead a test anxiety group with a group of fifthgraders.

12:30 to 2 p.m.

Lead a small group counseling session with fourth grade students on social skills.

2 to 4 p.m.

Attend a faculty meeting and provide updates on the counseling curriculum.

High School Counselor

9 to 10 a m

Lead guidance activity with a class on responsible social media use for adolescents.

10 to 11 a.m.

Write a recommendation letter for a collegebound student.

11 to 11:30 a.m.

Discuss counseling initiatives with a group of teachers over lunch.

11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Meet one-on-one with a student to create a time management plan.

12:30 to 2 p.m.

Discuss career opportunities with a small group of students.

2 to 4 p.m.

Facilitate a workshop for administrators to give feedback on the counseling curriculum.

Skills Required for School Counselors

To be successful, school counselors must enjoy spending time with children and adolescents and must be able to relate to their needs. They must have a lot of enthusiasm and a desire to constantly hone key skills, including the following:

Patience Active listening Organization
Empathy Communication Project management
Appreciation for diversity Leadership Time management

College Readiness

78.8%

High school graduation rates increased from 49% to 78.8% in schools that implemented the ASCA's National Model. 2-3½X

Students who work with a <u>school counselor</u> before tenth grade are 2 to 3.5 times more likely to apply to college.
